

Benefits Cliff: Definition

'Benefits cliffs (the 'cliff effect') refer to the sudden and often unexpected decrease in public benefits that can occur with a small increase in earnings. This happens when families receive benefits through a public assistance program, earn a raise and then become ineligible to continue receiving benefits despite being unable to sustain their household.

Sometimes the cliff effect looks more like a slope or plateau. When lost benefits outpace a wage increase, many families 'park' or fall off the cliff's edge, stalling progression in their jobs and careers."



How People Experiencing Cliffs Define the Problem

"Most of the time I am like, what's the secret handshake? How do I navigate this to get what I need?"




People ask me, 'What does 'being healthy' look like to you?' and I respond, 'Being healthy basically looks like being rich.'"




Slopes & Cliffs in Major Public Assistance Programs

Cliffs and Hills When Receiving Multiple Benefits

Family of 3, Most to Least Affordable Counties, Washington State 2024



Notes:

- Size and impact of gaps and cliffs differs by region, family size and age of children.
- The more expensive the cost-of-living, the larger the gap and cliff.
- Families fall behind while trying to get ahead.
- Employers are unable to advance talent, as loss of benefits, especially child care, outweighs salary increase.
- Cliffs are incompatible with achieving goals and outcomes.

Proposed Actions to Mitigate Benefits Cliffs

Proposal	Details	Impact on Cliff Effect
Prevent poverty.	• Set cash assistance to 15% of the Self-Sufficiency Standard	Mitigates cliff experience
Improve access to benefits.	Broaden time limitsRemove full family sanction policy	Removes a cliff
Provide employment stability payments and post-program supports.	 \$2,000 to WorkFirst participants at exit Expand supports after program exit 	Mitigates cliff experience
Cover basic needs for people with work-limiting conditions.	Cash assistance for people with a work-limiting condition	Mitigates cliff experience





Evidence-Based Effects of Economic Stability on Well-Being

ECONOMIC STABILITY...



LOWERS STRESS

Economic stability alleviates stress, freeing up the brain's capacity to make long-term decisions.

Less stress also reduces inflammation in the body.



IMPROVES WELL-BEING

Research strongly shows economic stability improves well-being within a short time frame.

RESULTS IN UPSTREAM, PREVENTIVE OUTCOMES

Research also shows economic stability has positive, upstream effects over time.
