Tracking change over time, seeking trends

- Annual Council report to policymakers includes data about the number of health professional program completions across a wide range of roles and trends among active licenses
- Completion counts combine data from Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS), LNI (registered apprenticeship), and private career schools
- Observing trends over time helps Council establish a well-informed picture about how efforts and policies are impacting the supply of workers



Tracking change over time, seeking trends

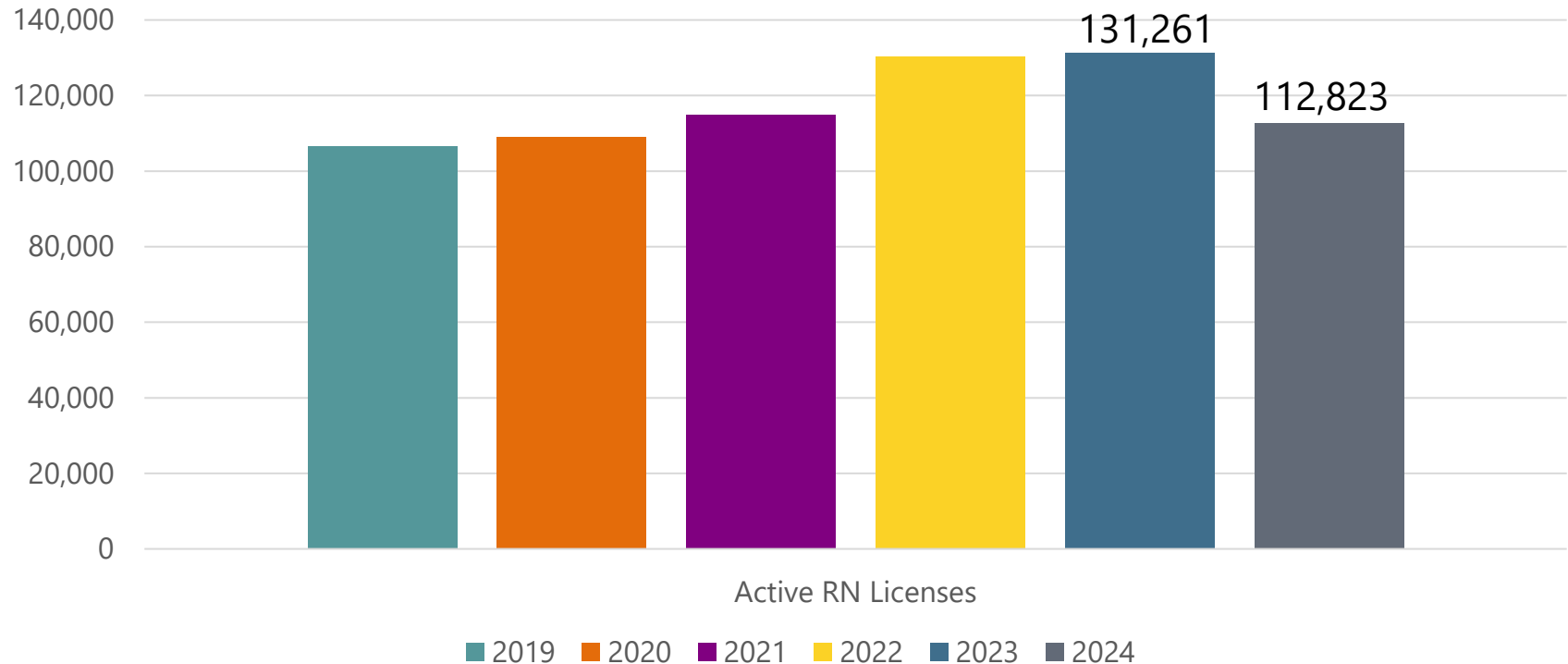

Total active RN licenses as of July 1

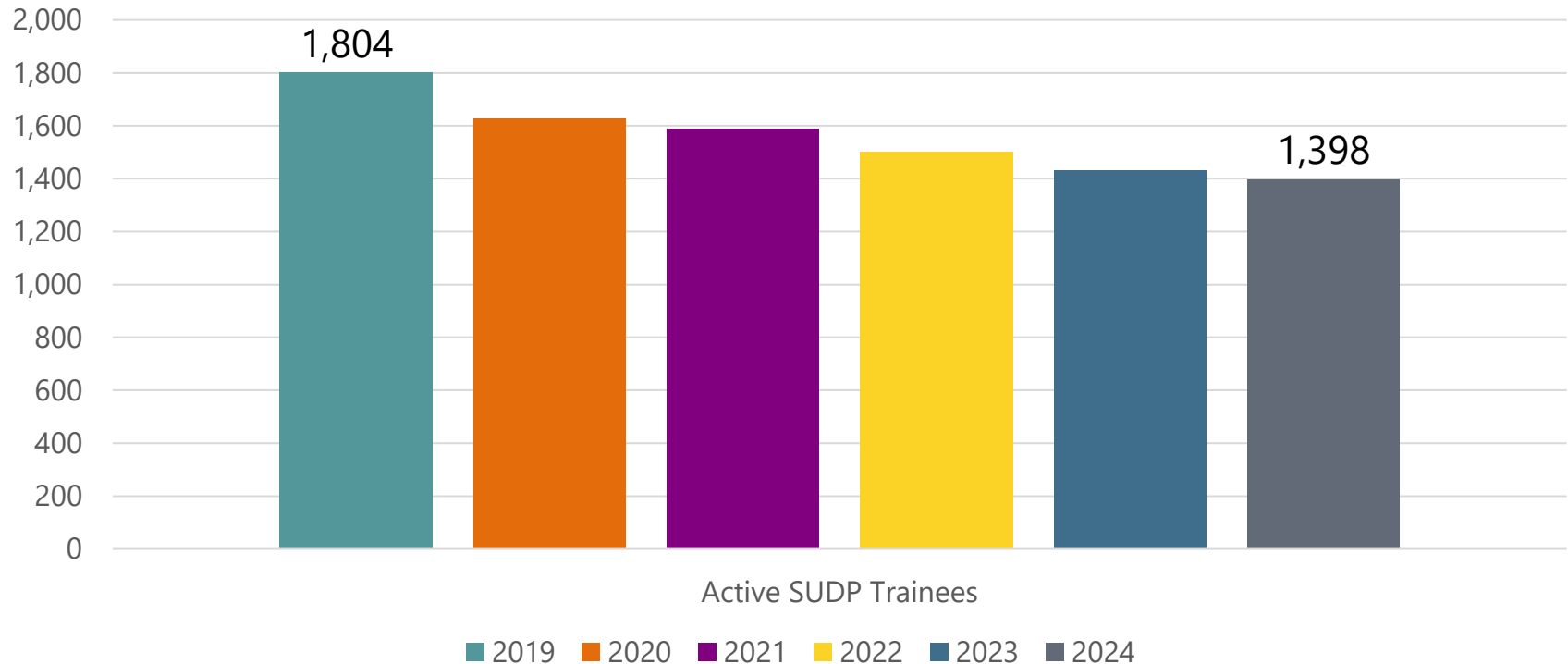

Look for impact of new programs

- Medical assistant profession has a registered apprenticeship option that qualifies for certification
- Examination of completions by program time helps us understand how apprenticeship is impacting overall supply
 - Total contribution to supply from MA apprenticeships continues to grow since first program graduated 18 apprentices in 2015
 - In 2022, 9 percent of MA completions were by apprentices (157)
 - In 2023, 16 percent of MA completions were by apprentices (272)
 - Overall completions across all program types (CTCs, private career schools, and apprentices) were flat from 2022 to 2023
 - Completions remain far below their recent high of 2,710 in 2015
