







Rates







Washington is a Well-Respected Leader in Reentry Services



- We were the first state to implement sentence alternatives
 - Community Parenting Alternative
 - Mental Health Sentencing Alternative
 - Drug Offender Sentence Alternative
 - Graduated Reentry
- For over 40 years, we have partnered with colleges to provide education to those in our care and custody.
- We are one of a few states that has Correctional Industries integrated in reentry and aligned with meaningful jobs.

Reentry Infrastructure





Reentry Begins at Reception



- Every incarcerated individual receives an *Individual Reentry Plan* on admission, for use throughout their stay.
- On admission we assess:
 - Medical and mental health needs
 - Education needs
 - Risk level and classification
 - Substance use history
 - Treatment and program needs

Roughly 96% of incarcerated people return to our communities.







Reentry Infrastructure



- The Reentry Division consists of 800 FTE's and a biennial budget of \$154 M GF-S
- Reentry services are education, programming, treatment, and work readiness.
- Reentry services exist in all 12 Prisons and 12 Reentry Centers
- 108 navigators help coordinate connections to:
 - Education
 - Essential needs
 - Housing
 - Healthcare
 - Parenting
 - Workforce development (jobs)
 - Community resources and connections

We Have Colleges in all 12 Prisons



For every dollar invested in corrections education, up to \$19.80 is saved from reduced recidivism in WA State (WSIPP, 2018).

We Provide Marketable Job Skills



- For every dollar invested in Correctional Industries (CI), up to \$12.68 is saved from reduced recidivism in WA State (WSIPP, 2018)
- Correctional Industries maintains and expands work training programs for marketable job skills that allow for a wage outside of crime.
- DOC has over 1,600 work opportunities including:
 - Braille Services
 - Computer-aided Design Services
 - Food Manufacturing/Service
 - Optical
 - Welding


