The Workforce Board requests maintenance funding to bolster staff support for the Health Workforce Council and Washington's Health Workforce Sentinel Network, which coordinate healthcare and behavioral health workforce research, planning, and policy reform.

Invest in critical health workforce infrastructure

The healthcare/behavioral health workforce is a vital component of Washington's infrastructure, essential to maintaining healthy communities. In recent years, this workforce has faced unprecedented challenges, prompting a statewide response and significantly expanding policy efforts.

To support the increased work, the Workforce Board seeks ongoing funding to add 1.65 FTE (bringing the total to 2.5 FTE) and increase support for Washington's Health Workforce Sentinel Network. These additional resources will strengthen workforce research and policy development. Current funding for the Health Workforce Council, behavioral health projects, and the Sentinel Network is insufficient to sustain the required data collection, analysis, and policy activities outlined by statute.

Impact Highlights

- Funding would maintain
 Washington's investment in
 the Health Workforce Council
 and support additional
 progress on crucial workforce
 goals as a behavioral health related proviso is ending.
- With only 0.85 FTE currently allocated, there is insufficient capacity to adequately support policy analysis and research for the state's healthcare workforce. This proposal would enhance expertise and coordination of health workforce issues across the state.
- A robust and diverse healthcare and behavioral health workforce is essential to serve the state's eight million residents, many of whom lack timely access to care.

workforce coordination and
health employer engagement,
and small enhancements
