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






Board Staff Legislative Portfolio

Theme: Access to Work-Based Education/Training

- **HB 1414 CTE Careers Work Group** OSPI/LNI work group on recommendations to increase # of youth completing CTE programs and certifications.
- 1722 Secondary Career Education Directs DOH, LNI, and the Fire Marshall's office to review processes for training.
- 5358/1280 CTE 6th Grade Funding and program changes to allow 6th grade CTE connected to an aligned program of study.



Theme: Expanding Social Program Access

- 1020 Academic Reengagement Lowers the age for youth to access academic reengagement programs like Open Doors.
- 1130 Development Disabilities Waiver Use Prioritizes highneeds DDA customers.
- 1263/5232 Essential Needs Program Uses Expands Cash Assistance eligibility for individuals in the Housing and Essential Needs (HEN) Program.
- 1463 Cash Assistance Time Limits Extends TANF benefit time limits for those with demonstrated financial hardship.
- **5681/1493 DDA Employment Services Age** Allows DDA to engage IEP customers at age 19 instead of 21.



Theme: Strengthening Worker Protections

- 1155/5437 Noncompetition Agreements Proposing a ban on non-compete agreements.
- 1181 Labor Standards Increasing the minimum wage and expanding paid leave.
- 1313/5525 Mass Layoffs Updating layoff process requirements.
- **1644 Working Minors** Enhancing workplace safety for youth.
- 5101 Worker Leave/Hate Crimes Requiring paid leave options for those affected by hate crimes.



Theme: Expanded Student Financial Aid Supports

- 1136/5164 Student Navigational Support FAFSA completion supports focused on high-poverty schools.
- 1568/5402 Modifying Financial Aid Eligibility Lowers the threshold to receive the WA College Grant and funds Bridge Grants of \$500 for qualified students.
- **1657 Washington 13 Free Guarantee** Funds up to 45 credits of the first year specifically at a CTC professional technical program, including registered apprenticeship.
- **5210/1151 Ninth Grade Success Grants** Support teams for students at early risk of not completing HS.
- **5543/1554 College Bound Scholarship** Program expansion for high school equivalency recipients. SBCTC Request bill.



Theme: Intersection of Education Policy & Health/BH

- 1259 Behavioral Health/Schools Provides BH supervision options while working in K-12.
- 1634 Comprehensive BH Supports for Students Network for state/regional providers to support and coordinate activities related to student BH needs.
- 5126/1547 Student Mental Health Network Strengthening state and regional coordination and provision + grant program for identifying at-risk students for BH support. OSPI Request bill.
- 5369/1663 Youth Mental Health/Schools Opens up access to increased use of Social Workers in K-12.



Theme: Supporting Military Personnel & Spouses

- 1016 Veterans/Employer Incentives Tax incentives for employers of veterans or their spouses.
- 1073 National Guard Retention –
 Program to review National Guard retention needs and bonus levels to encourage reenlistment.
- 1102 Veteran Support and Services –
 Expanding eligibility for recently discharged veteran services.
- 1161 Veteran Employability Creates a SBCTC program in one CTC to support veterans leaving correctional facilities, including navigation services and connecting with ESD and local WorkSource offices.

- 1166 DOC Reentry Education Addresses barriers to allow incarcerated individuals to purchase and use laptops for educational purposes.
- 1335 Military Spouse Employment
 - Adds military spouses to the list of protected classes from employment discrimination.
- 5420/1738 Veteran Benefits Access
 - Expands the definition of military veterans and service members to additional uniformed occupations for the purpose of accessing military benefits.

1273 – Dual Credit Program Access

Prime Sponsor: Rep. Paul

Status: House Education – Exec Session 2/17.

- Legislature Goal: Expanding dual credit opportunities and statewide articulation agreements, especially in CTE dual credit.
- Grant-funded pilot program (SBCTC lead, with OSPI) in three regions of the state to increase CTE dual credit and credential attainment in prof/tech programs.
 - Grant funds can support: Catalogue of dual credit programs, aligning CTE dual credit with postsecondary pathways, and TA/PD for developing and awarding dual credit.
- SBCTC, w/ OSPI, will report to the Legislature with recommendations for state dual credit policies (12/10/26 & 8/10/29).



1414 – CTE Careers Work Group

Prime Sponsor: Rep. Connors

Status: House Education – Exec Session Scheduled 2/18

- Directs OSPI, with LNI, to convene a work group focused on examining barriers to training, certification, and employment for 16-17 y/o students who have completed CTE programs.
- The work group should make recommendations on barrier removal for categories of work for minors who have a license from another agency, hour restrictions, and other training and employment barriers.
 - Workforce Board is named to the work group.
- Report due from OSPI to the Legislature (12/1/25 and 10/1/26).



1595 – Economic Development Plan

Prime Sponsor: Rep. Ryu

Status: House Appropriations – Not yet scheduled.

- Directs the Department of Commerce to develop a five-year economic development plan, including long-term, measurable goals.
 - First plan is due 11/30/25, with recommendations for legislation by 6/30/26.
- Advisory Committee membership includes the Workforce Board, key industry sectors, Governor's commissions, ESD, and others.
- Emergency clause: Takes effect 5/5/25.



1926 – Home Care Aide Testing

Prime Sponsor: Rep. Timmons

Status: House Postsecondary Education & Workforce – Public Hearing Scheduled 2/18, Executive Session 2/19.

- Allows Home Care Aide testing to occur at a training site as well as at a testing site.
- Removes requirement for certification within 200 days after hire; directs DOH/DSHS to establish new rules.
- Report due 9/1/26 with a rec on moving certification testing for home care aides to their training programs, as well as easing application processes.



5335 – Rural Nursing Education

Prime Sponsor: Sen. Slatter

Status: Senate Ways and Means – not yet scheduled.

- DOH is directed to establish a Rural Nursing Education Program, including access to distance education and training.
 - The Legislature funded a rural nursing workforce initiative in 2023 this bill uses the lessons learned and puts it into statute.
- Establishes program selection criteria, including intention to serve in a rural area.
- Consultation requirement includes local Workforce Development Councils.
- Report due 11/1/26, and every two years thereafter.



5682 – Customized Training Program

Prime Sponsor: Sen. Warnick/Rep. Salahuddin Status: Senate Ways and Means – Public Hearing 2/18.

- SBCTC's Customized Employment Workforce Training Program (CTP) is due to expire 7/1/26. The bill would extend the date to 7/1/31.
 - CTP provides employer loans for training programs to skill up employees.
 - Legislative tax preference stated an intent for the Legislature to extend the program if it was meeting certain goals around repayment and completion (confirmed in 2023).
- Requires a report 12/31/28 on program usage and expansion efforts.
